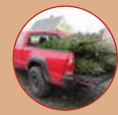

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Dreaming of a Green Christmas: Tips for the Holidays

Looking to incorporate a few eco-friendly / zero waste habits into your festive holiday traditions and activities of the season? We at Coastal Action have gathered up a few ideas that just might help! Have a look below to find a little inspiration for greening up your Christmas this year.

Gift Giving

Explore your creative side as a means of giving gifts to your loved ones:

- People love receiving a gift that you've made yourself just for them. Examples of easy and fun gifts include: homemade bath bombs, body butters, sugar scrubs, and candles (you can find easy instructions for all of these online). Christmas goodies - such as cookies, almond bark, and other tasty snacks - are also well-received. There are also plenty of recipe websites and blogs which cater specifically to the tummies of those with celiac disease, allergies, diabetes, and folks who are vegan or dairy-free.



Make a day of cutting your perfect tree!

- Still holding on to an unopened present you received last year, that you're unsure what to do with? Use this opportunity to re-gift, and pass the love along to someone you know will truly appreciate it!

- If you aren't feeling crafty, or simply don't have the time to prepare and create your own presents, try shopping locally. You'll find lots of charming and well-made gifts created by local artists, bakers, and artisans at shops, Christmas craft fairs, and farmers markets. Not only are you supporting your local producers and economy, you'll also save on the pollution associated with the manufacturing, packaging, and shipping of chain store items.

- Give the gift of experiences: yoga class, spa treatment, tickets to a festival, snowshoeing, or a night at the movies.

- Get creative with your wrapping: old maps, extra fabric you have lying around, burlap, or even an old newspaper wrapped with jute. Replace bows and ribbons with items found in your own yard, such as pine cones and tree clippings.

Christmas Trees

Make a day of visiting your local Christmas tree farm, tromping around and finding the perfect tree, and cutting it down yourself. Not feeling like hitting the outdoors? Find a local tree lot with trees cut and ready to load into your car.



These homemade cards come in a variety of styles, including: hand-painted illustrations glued to multicoloured papers, rubber stamp letters with gold pen accent, and a colour copy of an original illustration.

Once the tree comes down, consider these alternatives to placing your tree curbside: donate the tree to your local wildlife shelter (or your local goat farm!) for the resident critters to enjoy / munch on / shelter beneath; place your tree on your shoreline to help prevent erosion; chip or mulch your tree for use on your property and flower beds.
